BRANCH MEETINGS AND RIDES



any difficulty keeping up with the blistering pace set by Gene and Pat Austin. A stop at Sebastiani's winery provided an excellent tour of the facilities and a well deserved respite.

RAINY SUNDAYS

Sundays are frequently overcast in the Bay Area lately, but NORTON riders should not be discouraged if they get up on the morning of the Branch ride and see a few rain clouds. Quite often, the days start out looking gloomy, but end up being the best riding day because most of the Sunday driver crowd will have made some other plans by the time we ride. This leaves the roads relatively traffic-free for all the hardcore motorcyclists. The group on the April ride found both to be true and found a crisp, freshly washed day to enjoy with few motorists to slow things down too much. So, if you plan to go on the Branch ride and the weather worries you, call one of the two Branch officers and find out if the ride has been postponed until the following week. In general, it will still be riding weather if there is blue sky windward, and will be postponed only if there is no hope of clearing. You have our phone numbers, so give us a call if there is any doubt. When we are able, numbers will be given to the nearest phone at the ride meeting place, so you can get an on-sight report.

SECOND ANNUAL NORTON OWNERS CLUB BEER BUST - SUNDAY, APRIL 14th - LA HONDA

Well the time is finally upon us. This is what you've all been waiting for. Aren't you excited? The Second Annual Norton Owners Club Beer Bust will take place at the Cuesta Playbowl in La Honda on the afternoon of Sunday, May 14th. The event will be "sponsored" by the San Francisco Branch in the sense that all the leg work is being done by the Branch officers, and the beer will be purchased with funds in our Branch account, but we do plan to put a collection helmet next to the beer kegs and will ask all drinkers to pitch in a few shillings (or whatever) to help pay for the beer. The Playbowl, which is a small park in a redwood grove belonging to the Cuesta Guild in La Honda, will be loaned to the Branch for the day free of charge (your Branch secretary-treasurer is a Cuesta resident), but we will be REQUIRED to clean up whatever mess we create. Therefore, I would like to ask all members to do whatever they can to keep the mess to an absolute minimum by making use of trash cans and asking the non-members to do likewise. Your efforts will be greatly appreciated by those of us who have to clean up afterwards. If you can help with the clean-up before leaving, that too would be appreceated.

The plan is to set things up in the late morning, and any of you who haven't any better things to do on Mother's Day are invited to show up a little early and be available to help out as needed. We will have a keg of light beer and a keg of dark both of which will be transported over the hill on Saturday by Bob Marshall, and will be settled and cold by Sunday morning. In addition to the beer, we will provide some charcoal for those who wish to barbecue some burgers or whatever to wash down the beer with. The charcoal pits are already there so no need to worry about what to cook in, but you might want to bring some food with you or buy some at the Pioneer Market in La Honda, which has an excellent meat department and is very close to the Playbowl. Anything you might wish to bring for general consumption would be appreciated.

For those of you who have not yet had the experience, I heartily recommend a breakfast at Alice's Restaurant, which is located at the intersection of Hwy. 35 (Skyline Blvd.) and Hwy. 84 (known as Woodside Road or La Honda Road). A Sunday morning breakfast at Alice's is usually an excellent opportunity to checkout all the latest motorcycles and trick racing paraphernalia; the parking lot across the road has now become one of the major motorcycle meeting spots in the bay area, and in general there is a preponderance of cafe racers and a paucity of fulldress tourers. Those who like to put their Nortons through a few high speed turns once in a while might like to get on Skyline at its intersection with Hwy. 92 (San Mateo-Half Moon Bay) or Hwy. 9 (Saratoga-Boulder Creek), and then take Skyline to Alice's. Keep on until you find a bunch of motorcycles at the Skylonda junction, and don't give up at King's Mountain Road, as Maya Peterson did a few months ago.

Besides beer, food, and Nortons, there will be a few other diversions at the Beer Bust this year. A "Wellie toss" and some tug-o-war competition have been planned, and we may have an egg toss if there is enough space between all the parked Nortons. Further ideas would be greatly appreciated. There may even be some special prizes, such as awards for best antique Norton, most unusual Norton, most unusual Norton rider(?), etc. All suggestions will be most welcome, so please don't hesitate.

Most important of all is that you come. Bring an old Norton if you have one, and bring your Norton friends. You can even bring your mother if you wish, but come. We hope that all members will come to this meeting, especially those of you who haven't been to Branch meetings or rides in the past year. We would like to meet the people who have been only names and addresses to us thus far. Let's have a big turnout and a great day in the woods.
